e-Learning Questions? JISC Ask!

Q: I'd like to create some student activities that exploit resources that I've found on the Web but I don't have regular access to a computer lab. I'm not sure where to start can you make any suggestions.

A: I know it's sometimes difficult to organise access to computers and plan when you will require them in the context of a traditionally organised unit or course. My advice would be to keep it simple at the start and try to encourage your learners to investigate topics in a semi structured way by distributing activity sheets as "Word" documents. Feedback sessions to discuss, focus, contextualise and consolidate the topic can follow on. It is easy to insert a link to a website (hyperlink) by typing in the web address or copying and pasting the web address from the address bar in your browser. Press the space bar and the link will become active and change to blue, underlined text which links to the site.

A series of questions with links to appropriate information sources means that your learners will be pointed to sites that you have selected but will not be restricted to them if they wish to find others. It will allow you to exploit visually stimulating sites that can potentially include multimedia, quizzes and games if appropriate but does not involve learning a new software package or having specialist skills.

Federated Access Management



Identity management is becoming ever more important as many more learning resources & research papers become available online. Provided across many locations by many service providers it's becoming difficult to look after IDs and passwords for different users.

This is where Federated Access Management comes in. With a single user ID and password provided by your local college or university IT dept, the full range of materials your institution is licensed for becomes available, whether hosted on campus or on remote publisher servers. The RSC is investigating the impact this step change could make to your institution in terms of management & technical issues. If you are involved with learning resource management or IT technical support you may well benefit from signing up to the FAM-Scotland forum. This Forum is aimed at assisting in the development and implementation of a FAM campus strategy and supporting the management and technical issues that will no doubt arise across your institution.

Support will include workshops, discussions online and the encouragement of collaboration between the FE & HE community in South West Scotland. We will seek the advice from more experienced FAM practitioners and disseminate our findings to the forum.

INUK Freewire IPTV Service

After a successful trial UKERNA and INUK have signed an agreement enabling INUK to deliver its IPTV Freewire service to JANET connected organisations directly over JANET.

To access the service a software client requires to be downloaded onto a PC with no aeriels, receivers or servers needed on site.

The encoding system used reduces the bandwidth requirements for each channel so that the streams require approx half the bandwidth of an MPEG2 stream.

The package on offer includes:

- Licensed re-broadcasting of UK free-to-air channels.
- Licensed delivery of UK premium channels and on-demand content.
- A full range of licensed international channels.
- A dedicated TV channel for organisational video content.
- Digital Asset Management and Channel Management for organisations needing support to create or re-purpose their own content.
